Launched at the end of January, 10% of each purchase made on the site will be distributed among the over 200 participating independent bookstores, including Ann Arbor's own Bookbound Bookstore and Nicola's Books, and 10% will go to the bookstore that generated the sale. As creator of the site Andy Hunter said in a recent Forbes article, ""If we were to get 1% of Amazon's book sales that would be a massive level of support for bookstores." 


